Pell Grant Recipients as a Peer Metric



A higher percentage of UC Berkeley undergraduate students (32%) receive Pell Grants than the combined Ivy League (17%).

As an indicator of the University's ongoing commitment to economic diversity in our student population, our Pell Grant recipient counts are compared to peers using annual reporting from the U.S. Office of Postsecondary Education (OPE).

UC Berkeley and the Ivy League experienced declines in the number of Pell Grant recipients over the prior year.

This represents the most recent data published by OPE, which is the best source for peer data due to the consistent, near-final reconciliation methodology that is employed.

Pell Grant Description: The Federal Pell Grant Program provides need-based financial aid for low-income undergraduates through some 5,400 participating colleges and universities. The amount of the award is determined by the U.S. Department of Education (USDE) using a standard formula, and depends on student's financial need, the cost to attend, and full or part-time attendance status.

In comparing the number of Pell Grant recipients as a percentage of the undergraduate population, Berkeley's 32% is higher than the Ivy League average of 17% and Columbia's 22% (highest among the Ivies).

There was a 2% decline in the recipient count at Berkeley between 2014-15 and 2015-16. Ivy League schools ranged from a 4% decline (Penn and Harvard) to a 7% increase (Yale). The change for all Ivies combined is a decrease of less than 1%.

Berkeley's 32% Pell of total undergraduates is again the lowest percentage among UC campuses, which range from 62% at Merced to 36% at San Diego. Merced (+7%), Santa Barbara (+3%) and Irvine (+<1%) increased in recipient counts, while other campuses declined from <1% (UCLA) up to 2% (Riverside, Santa Cruz and San Diego).
